

✨ Applying Your Values (Biblical Principles)

1. Decision-Making Framework Based on Values

When faced with choices, filter them through your values and God's Word:

- **Step 1: Pray for Wisdom** *"If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God"* (James 1:5).
- **Step 2: Identify the Core Value at Stake** Example: Integrity, stewardship, compassion.
- **Step 3: Ask: Does this decision honor God and align with my values?** *"So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God"* (1 Corinthians 10:31).
- **Step 4: Choose the path that reflects obedience and consistency with your values.**
- **Step 5: Act with courage and faith.** *"Trust in the Lord with all your heart... He will make your paths straight"* (Proverbs 3:5–6).

2. Goal-Setting with Values as Anchors

Goals are temporary milestones, but values are enduring anchors. Aligning them ensures lasting fulfillment.

- **Step 1: Define Your Core Values** (e.g., love, stewardship, faithfulness).
- **Step 2: Set SMART Goals** that embody those values.
 - Example: If your value is **Stewardship**, set a goal to create a monthly budget and tithe faithfully.
- **Step 3: Anchor Each Goal in Scripture**
 - Stewardship → *"It is required of stewards that they be found faithful"* (1 Corinthians 4:2).
 - Love → *"Do everything in love"* (1 Corinthians 16:14).
- **Step 4: Review Goals Regularly** to ensure they remain aligned with values, not just ambition.
- **Step 5: Celebrate Progress as Faithfulness, not just achievement.** *"I press on toward the goal to win the prize"* (Philippians 3:14).

3. Communicating Values in Relationships and Work

Living values openly strengthens trust and clarity in both personal and professional settings.

- **Step 1: Speak Your Values Clearly** Share what matters most to you with family, colleagues, and clients. *“Let your ‘Yes’ be ‘Yes,’ and your ‘No,’ ‘No’”* (Matthew 5:37).
- **Step 2: Model Values Consistently** Actions speak louder than words. Integrity, compassion, and faithfulness must be visible. *“Set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity”* (1 Timothy 4:12).
- **Step 3: Use Values as a Conflict-Resolution Tool** When disagreements arise, return to shared values (e.g., respect, justice, love). *“If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all”* (Romans 12:18).
- **Step 4: Build Culture Around Values** In work or ministry, make values part of the team’s language and decision-making. *“Two are better than one... for if they fall, one will lift up his companion”* (Ecclesiastes 4:9–10).

Summary
